Pomp and Fanfare as Nurses Graduate at the Colliery School of Nursing



An electrifying atmosphere engulfed the Cricket Club, venue for the 2018 Hwange Colliery School of Nursing Graduation ceremony as 97 nurses graduated amid pomp and fanfare. All this happened in front of hundreds of guests drawn from all quarters of the town, district, province and the nation at large.

The event was more special for the entire Colliery family and the hospital in particular as the last ceremony was held in 2012.

In his welcome remarks, Medical Services Manager and Acting Managing Director, Dr Charles Zinyemba highlighted that as HCCL, the programme of training of student nurses is part of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

initiatives meant to benefit all the citizens of Zimbabwe.

“The nurses training initiative is meant to benefit all the people of our beautiful nation. Let me stress that this programme is not for Hwange Colliery Hospital as some might perceive, No it’s for the country at large.”

The Guest of Honour at the event, HCCL Board Chairperson, Ms Juliana Muskwe pledged continued Board support to the School of Nursing.

“The Board will ensure that the hierarchy of the organisation, and in particular the hospital team led by Doctor Charles Zinyemba, is given full support to ensure the School of Nursing continues to play this critical role of training nurses as this has had a positive impact in the nation’s health sector over the years,” read part of her speech.





The Minister of State for Provincial Affairs (Matabeleland North) Honourable Richard Moyo also commended the company for the various CSR initiatives.

“Besides this CSR initiative of training nurses, I would like to also thank HCCL for the good Corporate Social Responsibility work the organization is championing within the district and province, most recently the resuscitation of boreholes in Zvabomakuyu. HAND HYGIENE IN THE COMMUNITY

In the past many campaigns have been launched to promote the message “wash your hands”. The major aim of these campaigns is the prevention of the spread of infections such as cholera and typhoid.

Infectious diseases remain a burden in Zimbabwe and the world over. However, there is increasing evidence from research to suggest that good hand hygiene practices in the home and community prevent not only the spread of food and water borne infections but also has an important role in preventing the spread of many other common infections.

Global Hand washing day is commemorated on the 15th of October every year. This year’s theme is “clean hands, a recipe for health”. The theme focuses on the link between hand washing and food including food hygiene and nutrition.

Food and water borne illnesses

These are a serious problem worldwide. The WHO estimates that worldwide food and waterborne illnesses cause about 2.2 million deaths annually. Most of these illnesses could have been prevented by good hygiene practices. Good hygiene practices in the home during preparation for cooking is important to prevent cross contamination from raw to prepared foods and is also important to prevent contamination of food from infected family members.

Home hygiene

It is important to note that pathogenic microorganisms (germs) are introduced continuously into the home primarily by people, food and domestic animals. Sites where stagnant water accumulates for example sinks, U-bends, toilets, cleaning cloths, face cloths readily support microbial growth and can also become a primary reservoir of infection.

It is surprising to note that the basic notion that one cannot get infected unless pathogens are present in the home, and that if one or more links in the chain of infection are broken, an infection cannot take hold, is often not appreciated. Good hand hygiene which includes cleaning and disinfecting contaminated environmental surfaces and surfaces which come into contact with food is important in breaking the chain of infection.

The importance of hand hygiene in the home

Hands are probably the single most important transmission route for all types of infection. They come into contact with the known portals of entry for pathogens i.e the mouth, nose and eyes. Hands also come into contact with various surfaces in the home.

Breaking the chain of infection is not only about targeting the hands themselves but also doing it at the right time. At times it is obvious when to wash hands for example after visiting the toilet. There are times when it is not obvious that one should wash their hands, for example after touching the door and toilet flush handles.

Indications for hand hygiene

After using the toilet

After changing a baby’s nappy

After handling raw food e.g chicken, beef

After handling pets and domestic animals

Before eating or feeding a child

After contact with contaminated surfaces

After handling soiled tissues (used by self or others)

After contact with body fluids e.g vomit

Disrupting the chain of infection

This can be achieved through

Washing hands using soap or detergent and water.

Using Alcohol Based Hand sanitizers.



Hand washing

The following are the steps for effective hand washing



Alcohol based hand sanitizers

These can be used where access to hand washing facilities is limited. Alcohol based hand sanitizers are only effective if the hands are not visibly soiled. If the hands are visibly soiled hand washing using soap and water is recommended. Pocket sized alcohol based hand sanitizers are found in most pharmacies and supermarkets. They are easy to carry and can be used easily when needed.

Conclusion

There is so much attention being paid to the importance of hand washing. This is not all that is needed to avoid infections. Hygienic cleaning of surfaces and the environment and maintaining a clean house is vitally important. Pathogens/germs are constantly being transferred within the home environment from one surface to another by people through coughing, sneezing, through skin surfaces, pets, contaminated raw foods such as chicken. Pathogens from these sources can survive for some time on hands and other surfaces and are readily spread to other surfaces via hands. Since people do not always wash their hands when they should, and since we cannot wash our hands all the time, these surfaces pose a continuous and significant contamination risk,
