BRIEF HISTORY AND PROFILE OF CHIPANGANO

Hwange Football Club then known as Wankie Football Club was formed in 1940. This is the legal position, which differs with opinion elsewhere where it is stated that Wankie Football Club was formed in 1893 by a man named Albert Giese together with builders of a railway line between Bulawayo and Victoria Falls.

In fact, the Albert Giese theory is a mix up of facts involving two separate but related events, which are firstly, the introduction of the game of football into the mining town of Hwange formally Wankie and the formation of Wankie Football Club.

The formation date of the club is a case of legal technicalities. People did not sit down to come up with a constitution or such other formal processes to form the club. Football was already being played in the Colliery as early as the 1920s.

At that time, the Colliery had a group of miners who used to play football as a way of entertaining themselves and other mineworkers. This social group was then registered to play in the competitive Matabeleland Zonal League in 1940 and in the process; the birth of Wankie Football Club was announced. The year 1940 became the formation year because it is the year the club acquired its legal status by registration to a recognised body, which was the Matabeleland Zonal League.

This league was very competitive and played a big role in the growth the club. At that time, the club represented the Colliery Company in one of the most prestigious competitions in the country—the Chamber of Mines games.

The first mark of recognition and achievement for the Club came in 1969 when Wankie Football Club did the unthinkable for a club in Division 1. Wankie defeated Salisbury Callies, the giants playing in the Rhodesia Super League in the 1969 Castle Cup Final. The football order in the country had been re-arranged. This feat was no small achievement considering the colonial and social order at that time, a Salisbury Callies team composed of only white players being defeated by a team with all black coal miners as players.

It was the beginning of Wankie's Golden Generation, which dominated the scene for the next 6 years. The Cup final of 1969 heralded the arrival of an 18-year-old defence stalwart into the main football stream. Amos Rendo had spent six years travelling with the senior team as a team mascot from the age of twelve. He later rose to become one of the best central defenders in the country. He was chosen as one of the Soccer stars three times from 1974 to 1976. This is the same period when the likes of Tyman Ncube were playing their best football having entered the big scene at the same time as Amos Rendo. Towards the beginning of 1970, coach Sipriano Ngoma was replaced Daisy Roller who himself did not stay long in that position.

The year 1970 saw the Club open the gates of its current home, the Colliery Stadium. It is during

this period that a number of touring clubs from Europe, Scotland to be precise, visited Wankie and played friendly matches. The clubs that visited include Kilmarnock FC, Clyde FC, John Charles FC and Grasshoppers FC. It is also the period where a national representative side from the then Tanganyika, present day Tanzania visited Wankie and played against the Club. This recognition was as a result of many factors, but the two obvious sporting factors that contributed are the attractive and positive football the Golden Generation were playing as well as the condition of the Colliery stadium. The stadium was a state of the art facility during those days.

Jage Merger took over as coach from Daisy Roller in 1971 and the good work continued. The Club lifted the Castle Cup for the second time in its history this time humbling Dynamos via a penalty shootout in 1973.

After that feat disaster struck. The Coach Jage Merger packed his bags for Chibuku Shumba in Salisbury, present day Harare, which at the time was regarded as greener pastures. Merger did not go alone.

He left with the cream of the team in the form of the great Phosani Sibanda, Stephen Tshuma, Tyman Ncube, John Galasa and Kizito Tembo.

Fortunately, that was not enough to stop the coal machine. The Nyore Nyore Trophy was grabbed in 1974 and the Club reached the finals of the same trophy in 1975. In the same year, Wankie were second in the Rhodesia Super League where the Club lost the coveted prize by goal difference. After losing those players to Chibuku Shumba. The club had strengthened their base by acquiring players like George Phiri, Nyaro Mumba. Skeva Phiri and Austin Ncube from Kamativi and Mhangura Mines. It was very hard to grace the national calendar of soccer stars during those days. Other players apart from Amos Rendo who managed to appear in the Soccer Stars of the Year Calendar during the 1970 to 1977 period are Phosani Sibanda, Stephen Tshuma and Kizito Tembo. Sadly, 1980 marked the end of the golden generation. The defence stalwart Amos Rendo hung his boots in 1980 and most of his mates had done so between 1976 and 1979. The chapter had closed.

The new era that had commenced was a typical dry

season. By 1981, the signs that the Club was sinking had begun to show. Finally, in 1982 the Club was relegated from the Super League for the first time in its history! However, the introduction of State House Tornados saved the day for Hwange as the number of teams in the Super League increased enabling was Hwange to play Eagles of Bulawayo in a promotion playoff in which Hwange won by a good six nil margin. In 1983, the club was back in the Super league but as fate will decide, the team was relegated again. The team was in Division 1 for only a season, and in 1985, it was back into the Super League and won the Heroes Trophy during the same year. In 1987, the team relegated again was and bounced back in 1989 after spending just one season in the wilderness.

Since then the club has been relegated three more times, in 2007, 2017 and recently in 2019. The club once again visited its trophy cabinet in 1992 as Hwange won the ZIFA Cup and represented the country in the 1993-Cup Winners Cup competition where elimination was the result in the first round by Kenya Breweries of Kenya.

The Club also represented the country in the same competitions in 2012 where elimination came in the second round in the hands of Ahl Ally FC of Sudan. While the golden generation of the 1960s and early 70s produced arguably complete talented squads, the generations of 80s, 90s up to the present also saw a number of very high calibre individual talents. Some of these players include Walter Chuma. Takesure Chinyama, Fabian Zulu, Gilbert Zulu, Carrington Gomba, Method Mwanjali, Aaron Katebe, Evans Rusike, and Obert Moyo who went to play in other leagues in the COSAFA Region and beyond. It must also be noted that the club nearly produced another golden generation after 2001 but the mass exodus of eight who players were the backbone of the team extinguished the dream. The parting players among others goalkeepers included Witness Chenjerai Dube. Munkuli, defender Milos Phiri and midfielder Jabulani Ngwenya.



The setbacks as bad as they were, enabled the club to unveil new talent every season.

The club currently has more than 500 former players dotted around the country and beyond its borders, who once donned the famous gold and blue colours of the club back in the day and the current gold, black and red colours.

As many as they are, it will be impossible to forget names such as Chutika Tembo, David Khumalo, lsaac Phiri, Jimmy Sibanda, Chingumbe Maluku, Walter Chuma, David Phiri, Nation Dube, Taboniswa Ncube, Brian Njobvu Mebelo Dick Banda, Njekwa, Takesure Chinyama, Method Mwanjali, Carrington Gomba, Malvern Longwe and the current assistant coach Cobra Obert Moyo among many others.

After national independence in 1980, the club was home to many Zambian players namely Charles Chilufya, Chama Kaila, Joseph Mwansa, Aaron Katebe, Kennedy Katema, and Scott Lombe among many others.

Zambian coaches also came to bark orders

from our touchline. These include Mwape Sakala, the second African coach during the period of the golden generation to be in charge of the team after Sipriano Ngoma, Rodrick Simwanza, Vincent Mandona, Johns Chilengi and recently Tennant Chilumba who was with the club from 2011 to 2013.

From the pool of local coaches who were once in charge of the team, Paul Moyo is outstanding in terms of the influence he had on the team as well as the number of times, three to be precise, when he was in charge of Chipangano.

Moyo remains one of the coaches with very interesting episodes in their employment at Hwange. At one time, he was fired in the morning, and was rehired in the afternoon of the same day!

Other coaches like Nyaro Mumba, Weekly Mwale, Enerst Kamba, David Mwanza, and Tavaka Gumbo took charge of the team at different times but it is Nation Dube who enjoyed the longest stint at the helm of the team running close to fifteen years.
